DISCOVERY DAY 2002: HARVESTING YOUR PHES

Did you know that certain types of plants grow well together because they need the same things to be healthy? Did you know that beans, peas and other "legumes" actually help fertilize the soil to make other plants healthy by "fixing" nitrogen in their roots? And did you even know that certain herbs and flowers such as marigolds will help defend your vegetable garden from harmful insects because insects think they smell "stinky"?

Much to the delight of our PKU kids, the answers to these questions were *discovered* in a hands-on *Garden Play* activity offered by *Garden Play* Specialist, Robbi Hursthouse, HTR at Children's Memorial Hospital, Chicago, Illinois. "When you plant a garden of plants that help each other to be healthy you are planting a *Companion Garden*," Ms. Hursthouse explained. "You don't have to have a lot of space. Your garden can be as simple as a container or flower pot sitting on your porch."

Our young gardeners chose five kinds of plants and/or seeds from an assortment of vegetables and flowers that are compatible because they need the same type of soil, fertilizer and even the same amounts of water and sunshine. A special "soil-free" potting mix provided the appropriate balance of nutrients and our kids provided the TLC.

Through special games and activities relating to gardening, fruits and vegetables, Susan Ruohonen,

Clinician; Danielle Perron, Genetics Counselor; and Rhoda Papanastassiou, Dietician helped children explore the parallels between the particular care needed by their *Companion Gardens* and the special care our kids give themselves and support to each other.

The Garden Play program, now in its 18th year, began as a collaborative effort between the Child Life Department of Children's and the Chicago Botanic Garden. Garden Play is offered on a weekly basis to the inpatients of Children's as well as special seasonal programming for outpatients.

BH4 Research Projects

CHILDREN'S MEMORIAL HOSPITAL - by Dr. Barbara Burton

The PKU Clinic at Children's Memorial Hospital, under the direction of Dr. Barbara Burton, is conducting a research project designed to determine what fraction of patients with PKU respond to treatment with the drug tetrahydrobiopterin, also referred to as BH4. Startup funds for the project have been provided by the PKU Organization of Illinois. Early research in other countries has indicated that the blood phe level in some patients with PKU can be lowered by using BH4, a vitamin-like substance. In patients who respond to the medication, it may be possible to increase the amount of phe in the diet or conceivably to even eliminate dietary restrictions. Research thus far suggests that patients with mild PKU are most likely to benefit from the medication but too few patients with classical PKU have been tested to draw any firm conclusions. The study at Children's Memorial will include children and adults 3 years of age or older with either mild or classical PKU. It will involve allowing the blood phe level to rise for several days then giving a single dose of the medication and subsequently doing serial phe levels over 24 hours to determine whether or not a decline is observed. If some patients are found to respond to the medication, the plan will then be to continue treatment while testing to see how much relaxation of the diet is possible.

BH4 is classified as an investigational new drug in the United States and can only be prescribed in the context of a research project with Institutional Review Board approval. Questions regarding the study can be addressed to Dr. Burton at 773-880-4462 or bburton@childrensmemorial.org

The PKU Clinic at University of Illinois at Chicago will also be performing the tetrahydrobiopterin (BH4) testing. Questions regarding the study can be addressed to Dr. Hoganson.

PKU Medical Products and IDPH

You may have recently received a letter from IDPH stating that they need updated prescriptions on you/your child in order to send out the medical product. If you have been to see your PKU specialist within the past 6 months, you/your child will have an updated prescription at IDPH. So, you do not need to do anything at this time. As long as IDPH has an updated prescription, you/your child will not have an interruption in the delivery of medical product.

If you have not been seen by your PKU specialist within the past 6 months, you need to contact your specialist to schedule clinic visit as soon as possible. Once you/your child has been seen by the PKU team, an updated prescription can be sent on to IDPH and medical product can be ordered/delivered without any questions.

Since there are so many products available now, it is becoming a challenge to know exactly how much of which products to order. By having current prescriptions at IDPH, they can better guesstimate how much product they need to order. That way we can be sure that there is enough product available throughout the year for everyone.



Swimming Party!



Expression of Phenylalanine-free Zein Protein in Transgenic Soybean as a Value-added Trait for PKU Patients

Longterm objectives and specific goals. The long-term objective of our research project is to provide phenylketonuria (PKU) patients a more nutritious, versatile, and palatable source of dietary protein free of phenylalanine as well as providing an alternative market for soybean through the production of a value-added (nutraceutical) trait. Recombinant phenylalanine (PHE)-free gamma zein protein produced in soybean, whose nutritional content is stable to heating/baking, is one possible solution. These objectives will be attained in three phases; Phase I: the production and molecular characterization of transgenic soybean plants expressing the PHE-free gamma zein gene; Phase II: seed increase of selected transgenic lines, the large scale extraction of the PHE-free gamma zein protein and nutritional and digestibility studies of the PHE-free gamma zein protein; and Phase III: commercialization. The proposed work is the first phase of this project. In our current proposal we will: (1) complete the construction of expression vectors for soybean seed-specific expression of a recombinant phenylalanine-free gamma zein protein; (2) perform particle bombardment of soybean embryogenic cultures with the zein gene vector constructs and isolate fertile plants, and (3) perform genetic and protein analyses on transgenic plants.

Side note: This grant is a continuing collabo-

rative effort initiated by Bryan E. Hainline, MD, Ph.D. (Section of Pediatric Metabolism and Genetics, J.W. Riley Hospital for Children, Indianapolis, IN). The above grant would not have been possible without the help and expertise of Dr. Hainline and collaborator Dr. Bruce Hamaker (Purdue University) whose initial research has given us preliminary data to show the feasibility of the project. Both Drs. Hainline and Hamaker will continue to be involved with this project as we will need to perform nutritional and digestibility studies in their laboratories. The Kansas Soybean Commission has supported our efforts in soybean transformation for the past several vears and was also crucial for us to obtain this recently awarded, three-year USDA/NRI competitive research grant to begin on Phase I of our project. The KSC will continue to be involved as this project evolves.

The Jewel Shop & Share from 5/20-5/22 raised \$194.02 for the Organization. Fifty-two people participated and spent a total of \$3,880.34. The Organization received 5% of the gross amount spent.

PKU Resource Mothers Training - Cambridge, MA April 26-28, 2002

I was given a wonderful opportunity to go to Cambridge, MA for the PKU Resource Mothers Training. This was with the backing of the PKU Org of IL and Hazel Vespa, Social Worker from Children's Hospital. I went with a wonderful group of PKU Mothers; Kelly Reilly, Liz VanArsdell, Judy Raffe, and Cindy Bouk. The coordinators attending were Hazel Vespa, of Children's and Barb Goss, of U of I. Also attending where wonderful women from across the country. These women had children with PKU ranging in age from 2-41 years of age. They are deeply committed to helping the young PKU women with their diet before and during pregnancy.

The role of the Resource Mothers is to help women with PKU to gain metabolic control before and/or

during pregnancy by providing social support and promoting a positive outlook on life through home visitation. The Resource Mothers are all women with children with PKU and thus understand the diet and hardships associated with PKU.

On Friday, Dr. Harvey Levy presented case studies on women with PKU and their pregnancies. Today there are 4,000-5,000 young women with PKU who are at age

where they can reproduce. There is a generation of PKU women who did not stay on diet due to various circumstances. These young PKU women are faced with the daunting task of getting back on diet if they are considering becoming pregnant or are pregnant. They are hearing the frightening repercussions of being pregnant and not being on diet. The results on the fetus of PKU women who have high phe levels, above 2-6mg/dl are:

- Mental Retardation
- Congenital Heart Disease
- Microcephaly (small head size)
- Low Birth weight
- Low Development
- Language Deficits



PKU women can have healthy children if they maintain a strict diet prior to and during pregnancy. If the diet is not started prior to pregnancy there is a risk of ongenital heart disease in the fetus. The heart begins to form within the first 30 days of gestation, thus the first trimester is the most critical.

With what these women are facing is extremely difficult. So in addition to the doctors, clinics, and dieticians giving them support, they also can receive the support of the PKU Resource Mothers. In addition to the Resource Mothers Program we need to start the

education process when these girls are too young to consider pregnancy. We need to support the camps for these young women so they become aware early of the importance of diet for life.

A women with PKU in her 30's spoke at the training. She stated she had no contact with others with PKU as she was growing up. This made her feel isolated. Therefore, if you're a teen or

young adult with PKU you need to let the PKU Organization of Illinois know what type of programs and activities you would like to see. We need to keep the connection with others in the PKU community alive. The organization needs your feedback.

A big perk during the weekend is having Diane Sullivan provide us with recipes and cooking demonstrations. There was also the introduction of Cambrooke Foods Quick Mix. This mix makes some wonderful foods that are very easy to make.

It was a wonderful weekend as I learned a great deal and meet some wonderful coordinators and PKU mothers.
